Impactful Projects

DENTAL CLINIC PARTNERSHIP

Kingsport has entered into a partnership with the University of Tennessee, East Tennessee State University and Ballad Health to bring a dental clinic to the Model City – a \$5 million project nearly 10 years in the making.

The new facility will be located at 111 W. Sevier Ave., near Holston Valley Medical Center. Students will perform their residency requirements through the University of Tennessee at the clinic in partnership with Ballad Health. The clinic also would serve UT and ETSU dental students performing their two-week rotations.

Plans call for a multi-phase approach to transforming the dental clinic into a dental school. Phase two would allow students to complete their last two years of dental school, while phase three would lead to the facility becoming a full-fledged, four-year accredited school.







Construction of the clinic is expected to begin this spring with plans to open in fall 2024.

DOBYNS-BENNETT DOME RENOVATIONS

To provide a high-quality environment for Dobyns-Bennett High School students and community use and to retain an iconic structure central to the Kingsport spirit, school and city staff are working together on renovations to the Buck Van Huss dome that will serve current and future generations. Investments will include improvements to items such as the dome's signature Lamella structure, HVAC systems, seating, lighting, audio system, scoreboards and playing surface. Surrounding school spaces, such as entryways, student areas and offices, are also slated for renovation. Construction is anticipated to begin in fall 2023.



The renovations of the Kingsport Public Library will touch every part of the library. The focus of the renovations is not only flexibility in order to meet the needs of the citizens of Kingsport today, but also into the future.

The children's spaces will be enlarged for children and families to gather, learn and grow together while separate spaces will be created for older children and teens. Comfortable spaces to read, study or work together, including a planned rooftop patio, will be incorporated.

Existing meeting and program space will be updated. Additional spaces to meet, including small meeting rooms, story time space and flexible meeting and program space in the basement, will be added. The existing Makerspace will move to a dedicated space allowing for the resources to be used regularly with additional open lab and maker-specific classes to be scheduled and more tools to be added for the community to use.

The Tribe Sports initiative experienced a number of milestones in 2022 and posted strong participation numbers in basketball, grew interest in swimming and saw the launch of youth football and cheer programs.

Tribe Basketball is composed of seven teams – two second grade, two third grade, two fourth grade and one fifth grade – with approximately 58 kids and 16 coaches in the program. Each team practices twice a week and either participates in a Saturday tournament or a skill session led by a Dobyns-Bennett High School coach.

Tribe Youth Football and Cheer includes the Lynx (Lynn View Pee-Wee Football) and the Kingsport Raiders (Bloomingdale Optimists) with the Dobyns-Bennett football coaching staff as a voting member and the City of Kingsport serving in an advisory capacity.



The mission of Tribe Sports is to have one, over-arching organization for competitive sports in Kingsport.

"Our goal is to have a cohesive, long-term sports program in Kingsport to get kids involved and stay involved throughout the course of their youth," Assistant City Manager Michael Borders said.

MAIN STREET REBUILD


Main Street, a gateway into our downtown, is being rebuilt from East Sullivan Street to Clay Street. Contractor Summers-Taylor has started removing roadway and installing new water lines and utilities.

Over the past century, soil underneath Main Street has weakened to the point where new asphalt simply failed. The project also includes placing telephone and cable lines underground, relocating power lines and adding landscaping and curb extensions.


The \$20 million project is funded by \$13,768,520 in federal and state dollars, \$2,783,795 from the city's general fund and \$3,625,444 from the city's utility fund.

CONNECTKINGSPORT

The ConnectKingsport app allows residents to have a direct line of communication to the city to report a variety of non-emergency concerns in more than three dozen categories, including drainage issues, dead animal removal, graffiti, potholes, water leaks, renter complaints, high grass and sewer backups.

To date, over 11,000 issues have been resolved.

The app also provides links to the city's website, animal services, CivicRec, KATS, an events calendar and the police and fire departments. ConnectKingsport uses GPS to recognize your location and provides a menu of common quality-of-life conditions to select from when submitting a request. The app allows you to upload pictures or videos to accompany your request. Residents then can track the status of reports they or other members of the community have submitted until the issue is resolved.

Back at the office, city staff will leverage powerful dashboards and reporting tools to identify hot spots, increase productivity, prioritize projects and spend tax dollars smarter. "ConnectKingsport is the best way to report issues you see in the city," Administrative and Communications Coordinator Sara Nowell said. "Plus, it gives you a direct link to This Is



Kingsport, the website that answers the question 'What is there to do in Kingsport?' by providing a comprehensive calendar full of events throughout the city."

PAVING PROGRESS

Kingsport has allocated \$3.5 million in fiscal year 2023 toward sustainable paving efforts. In the fall of 2022, 3.5 miles of streets in neighborhoods near the Walmart Supercenter on Fort Henry Drive were paved. Ten additional street miles in Area 28, which includes neighborhoods within Fort Henry Drive to John B. Dennis Highway to Memorial Boulevard to Skyland Drive, will be paved in the summer of 2023 before work transitions to Area 17 in Fairacres in the fall of 2023.

Annually, Kingsport budgets \$2.5 million-\$3 million, resulting in 17-21 miles of repaving for city roads.

BAYS MOUNTAIN PARK UPGRADES

You might notice some upgrades happening around the park this winter and spring, including the Nature Center balcony improvements.

Inland Construction started the project in 2022 by power washing the balcony and repairing existing cracks. Other improvements included the addition of Eastern Red Cedar boards to both sides of the balcony and sealant placed on the floor. Visitors also can enjoy the view of the reservoir while sitting on new chairs.

KINGSPORT JUSTICE CENTER EXPANSION

The Kingsport courtroom consolidation project's main goal is to provide a safe, modern and functional space for all legal proceedings handled within Kingsport. Currently, the court system is separated into two buildings, the old City Hall and the Justice Center. Two new courtrooms and various offices are being added to the Justice Center to allow it to accommodate all court proceedings. Additionally, the project provides a significant expansion for the Kingsport Police Department, which has grown in size since the original space was occupied more than 30 years ago.



FIRE STATION 2

Fire Station 2 on Crescent Drive was opened in 1942. The fire station covers the areas of Dobyns Addition, Borden Park and Highland, including Dobyns-Bennett High School. Due to a fire facility evaluation, it was determined that a new station was needed and could be constructed on the adjacent property. The reason for the new station is not only normal aging, but also the size of the station does not allow for the current apparatus size/housing of equipment and is not ADA compliant. The construction of the new station will be in conjunction with the use of the current station, and the level of service will not be interrupted during this time.

The City of Kingsport hopes to secure funds for this project in 2023 and once construction starts, the fire station will be completed in roughly 12-18 months.



WATER METER UPGRADES

Envocore, a Maryland-based company contracted by Kingsport, started installing 10,000 new water meters within the city's service area earlier this year. This marks the next major phase of the city's overall \$4.8 million water meter replacement project.

This phase began in the Colonial Heights community with future areas to include Sullivan Gardens, Meadowview, Fordtown Road and Lynn Garden. All of these meters should be installed by June 30, 2023.

The water meter replacement project dates to December 2020, when the batteries in some water meters started to fail earlier than anticipated. As a result, the city's utilities department was not able to electronically detect an accurate reading of water usage. In response, the city began replacing these water meters with new ones in the spring of 2021. Kingsport anticipates having all remaining water meters in its 39,000-count system replaced with new ones within the next couple of years.

To date, more than 17,000 new water meters have been installed, allowing the city to obtain readings remotely. A base station and nine repeaters were installed across the water system last fall to receive the usage information from the new water meters. The remaining meters are being read manually each month.



Economic Development

Growth Continues for Kingsport in Multiple Sectors

HOUSING UPDATE

The city is continuing to see a vast influx of people who want to call Kingsport home, causing a spike in residential development to meet that demand. Kingsport has more than 2,100 housing units in the works. This flourishing market will have a considerable impact on the city's economic growth going forward.

Over the last several years, Kingsport staff and the Board of Mayor and Aldermen (BMA) have made a concentrated effort to assist in making the city an attractive place for developers and builders to work. Strategic planning initiatives that focus on housing and development include hiring a development coordinator to serve as a "one-stop-shop" point of contact, as well as new regulations and processes to streamline reviews and approvals.

The city has invested in new technology to allow builders, contractors and developers to apply for permits and submit plans electronically. This new technology will provide real time updates to applicants, letting them know where the submittal is in the process. The new technology has also attracted a diverse group of builders and developers from various locations on a local, regional and even national level.

Kingsport needs new housing options to support a growing population. According to the U.S. Census,

the city saw a 15.7% growth. There are more than 23,000 households within the city.

NEW BUSINESSES

Downtown Kingsport has seen more new businesses open or be in the process of opening within the past year, including restaurants, beauty services, entertainment, a brewery, retail and professional services. New businesses residents should visit include Shooters Billiards, Two Dads' Downtown Deli & Ice Cream Parlor and Toadally Pets.

New businesses are also taking root in other parts of town with 7 Brew recently opening on East Stone Drive and another Scooters Coffee on the way on the west end of town. We expect to see more announcements in the coming months.

DOWNTOWN KINGSPORT LOAN PROGRAM

In the past year, the Downtown Kingsport Loan program launched to provide financial opportunities for small business owners, property owners or investors to purchase or renovate a downtown property or to purchase equipment for the direct purpose of business creation, expansion or retention.

The program offers the possibility of a low-interest loan of up to \$25,000 (in some circumstances the loan can exceed \$25,000) to be applied toward the down payment and/or closing costs for any existing or new business within the Downtown Redevelopment District.

LYNN GARDEN CORRIDOR STUDY

The City of Kingsport has partnered with the Greater Kingsport Alliance for Development (GKAD) to create a corridor study for Lynn Garden Drive. GKAD is the non-profit arm of the Kingsport Housing and Redevelopment Authority.

Kimley-Horn, a Nashville-based consulting firm, will conduct the study. Work will include a site visit, market research and review of the existing land use along both sides of Lynn Garden Drive. The study will include a list of parcels that are strong/stable, as well as those that are underutilized or susceptible to change.

The study will take approximately eight months to complete with a projected end date of June 2023. Once done, Kimley-Horn will present the city with a final plan that will include land use and development options, key catalyst sites, renderings for select locations along the corridor and ideas for public sector improvement projects.



KINGSPORT ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT BOARD

In addition to its involvement with the Brickyard Park/Cement Hill project, the Kingsport Economic Development Board (KEDB) has facilitated the sale of numerous pieces of property by sending out five Request for Proposals (RFPs) on separate pieces of property and has voted to sell to a buyer on each one.

The revitalization of the old Citizens Supply building on Main Street (as pictured below) is moving closer to completion, and the townhouse development next door is still on schedule. A property committee also has been formed to evaluate land to acquire and make plans for future business parks.

KEDB finances, acquires, owns, leases and/or disposes of properties to maintain and increase employment opportunities and increase the quantity of available housing by promoting industry, trade, commerce, tourism and recreation and housing construction by inducing manufacturing, industrial, governmental, educational, financial, service, commercial and recreational enterprises to locate in or remain in Kingsport.

THE INVENTOR CENTER

The Inventor Center is a community-focused space for makers, artists and thinkers to create, collaborate and improve our region. The center provides a safe opportunity for members and the wider community to engage through classes, tools and workspaces.

The Inventor Center is a collaborative effort by the Model City Makerspace, Engage Kingsport and the City of Kingsport. Through this partnership The Inventor Center has grown to include equipment such as computer numerical control (CNC) and milling machines that are not found in many makerspaces.

In addition to training, community-building events and classes, The Inventor Center takes on projects to benefit the larger community and has prototyping equipment helpful to inventors and entrepreneurs.

The Inventor Center is part of Innovation Village, a partnership among key businesses in the area that are focused on entrepreneurial and small business development. The Inventor Center is focused on the first stage – the joy in making that drives members to become entrepreneurs and sell and market their work. The existence of Innovation Village has created a structure of resources for everyone from the casual maker to small businesses that already are thriving.

RIVERBEND PARK

A new 20-acre park along the South Fork of the Holston River currently is under construction with the first phase expected to be completed by end of summer.

Riverbend Park ultimately will stretch from Riverbend Drive to Wesley Road and calls for gateway entrances at both ends of the trail, various play areas, pavilions, restrooms, benches, scenic spots and interpretive signs.

The first phase of the project is underway and includes a halfmile, granite walking trail along the river, fishing pier and emergency access to the park. Most of the work on the lower trail is complete, while the piers for the boardwalk are



nearly finished. Major work remaining is the asphalt paving of the path to the boardwalk and boardwalk and floating dock construction.

TVA is funding and working with the city to improve the existing parking area at the end of Wesley Road to include an ADA parking space. Kingsport has designed Riverbend Park to be a multi-phase project and one that can be developed over five to 10 years.



Kingsport's leisure services software – called CivicRec – allows residents to find information about all of the activities, classes and sporting events taking place within the city. In addition, residents are able to register for events, make payments, manage memberships, reserve facilities and more, all conveniently online through a computer, tablet or smartphone.





PUMP TRACK

A bicycle and skateboard pump track soon will be the latest addition to the Brickyard Park complex. Last fall, city leaders awarded a \$1.3 million bid to GRC Construction to build a pump track adjacent to the Scott Adams Memorial Skate Park.

A pump track is a type of course that allows bikers or skaters to move along a track without pedaling or putting their feet on the ground. Users pump their knees up and down, following the contours of the track to move forward. Pump tracks typically are safer for bikers and skaters because there's less pedaling or pounding of feet against the ground.

The project calls for an addition to the paver plaza, additional seating at the skate park, central plaza area, three shade structures, additional parking, Musco lighting and the asphalt pump track.

Work is expected to start in the spring with the facility opening later this fall in 2023.


