1. CALL TO ORDER: 4:30 p.m. by Mayor Clark.

2. ROLL CALL: By City Recorder Demming. Absent: Alderman Betsy Cooper

- **3. KEEP KINGSPORT BEAUTIFUL UPDATE.** Robin Cleary gave a presentation on KKB what all they accomplished this past year. She pointed out that for every dollar that is taken in, \$80 of benefits is put back out into the community. Ms. Cleary also gavd details on what is coming up in 2019, including some new events.
- **4. NEIGHBORHOOD COMMISSION QUARTERLY REPORT.** Ms. Margot Seay discussed this item and answered questions from the board. She highlighted the goals of 2019, noting they would be visiting neighborhoods this year instead of holding monthly meetings.
- **5. KINGSPORT THEATRE GUILD UPDATE.** Ms. Tina Radtke, Executive Director for KTG, presented this item highlighting the fiscal impact that KTG has on the community bringing patrons to Kingsport. She stated that based on the Americans for the Arts data that KTG is bringing in a quarter of a million dollars into Kingsport each year. She also confirmed for Alderman Adler that KTG gives more back to the city in theatre rental than what is provided in the city grant. Some discussion followed.
- 6. REVIEW OF AGENDA ITEMS ON THE DECEMBER 18, 2018 REGULAR BUSINESS MEETING AGENDA. City Manager Fleming and members of staff gave a summary or presentation for each item on the proposed agenda. The following items were discussed at greater length or received specific questions or concerns.
- VI.B.1 Amend General Projects Fund Budget and Reappropriate Existing Funds from the Bays Mountain Park & Planetarium Septic System Project to the Bays Mountain Park & Planetarium Parking Lot Improvement Project (AF: 275-2018). City Manager Fleming gave an update on this project and noted the bid would go out in January for the parking lot.

Minutes of the Regular Work Session of the Board of Mayor and Aldermen of Kingsport, Tennessee, Monday, December 17, 2018

- VI.D.1 Bid Award for the Purchase of Four (4) 19-Passenger Cut Away Style Mini-Buses (AF: 235-2018). City Manager Fleming pointed out this item was presented at the last meeting but a correction needed to be made. This is not an additional purchase.
- VI.D.2 Establish The Kingsport Land Bank, Inc. and Approve Proposed Charter for Submission to Tennessee Secretary of State (AF: 278-2018). Development Services Director Lynn Tully presented this item, noting this authority is granted by the state with only twelve allowed. She stated there were three that have already been established Memphism Chattanooga and Oak Ridge. The purpose of this authority is for the conveyance of vacant, abandoned, troubled, and tax delinquent properties. It would be used as a tool to compliment code enforcement and remove/transform potential public nuisance properties. Discussion followed on how properties would be identified and the process of clearing titles to these properties. Ms. Tully then discussed funding sources, associated costs and next steps.
- VI.D.5 Acquisition of Portion of Property for Road Salt Quonset Hut (AF: 281-2018). City Manager Fleming provided details on this item, stating it was half an acre behind Food City and would greatly improve the response time to the Rock Springs, Colonial Heights, Moreland Drive and Fall Creek areas. Assistant City Manager for Operations Ryan McReynolds provided further information and answered questions. Some discussion ensued.
- **VI.D.6** Consideration of 2019 Joint Tri-Cities Legislative Policy (AF: 280-2018). City Manager Fleming provided details on this item, pointing out that Johnson City and Bristol have altready approved this. Vice-Mayor McIntire stated some key elements were missing, but they could be addressed individually at a future date.
- **7. ADJOURN.** Seeing no other matters presented for discussion at this work session, Mayor Clark adjourned the meeting at 6:30 p.m.





WHEREAS, passage of the proposed legislation would continue that practice; and

WHEREAS, T.C.A. section 55-26-101 and 102 provides additional legislative authority to regulate pedal carriages and rickshaws currently applying only to home rule municipalities or metropolitan governments; and

WHEREAS, with passage of the proposed legislation, T.C.A. section 55-26-101 and 102 would apply to Kingsport.

Now therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF MAYOR AND ALDERMEN AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION I. That the city manager is authorized to seek introduction and passage of legislation by the Tennessee General Assembly that would continue management and operation of the Kingsport Public Library by the city manager and the library board as an advisory board.

SECTION II. That the proposed legislation shall be in a form required by the Tennessee General Assembly and may be similar to the following:

AN ACT to amend Tennessee Code Annotated, Section 10-3-103, relative to libraries in counties, cities, and towns.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF TENNESSEE:

SECTION 1. Tennessee Code Annotated, Section 10-3-103, is amended by adding the following as new subdivision:

(d) A city having a population of not less than forty-eight thousand two hundred (48,200) nor more than forty-eight thousand three hundred (48,300), according to the 2010 federal census or any subsequent federal census may, by a two-thirds (2/3) majority vote of its legislative body, vest supervisory authority over the public library system with the city manager. The city manager of the city shall exercise all powers which would otherwise be exercised by the library board pursuant to § 10-3-104. A library board shall be retained in the city in accordance with this section, but shall serve in an advisory capacity to the city manager.

SECTION III. That the city manager is authorized to seek introduction and passage of legislation by the Tennessee General Assembly pertaining to pedal carriages and rickshaws that would include Kingsport in the current legislation applicable to pedal carriages and rickshaws.

SECTION IV. That the proposed legislation shall be in a form required by the Tennessee General Assembly and may be similar to the following:

AN ACT to amend Tennessee Code Annotated, Section 55-26-102, relative to the pedal carriages and rickshaws.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF TENNESSEE:

SECTION 1. Tennessee Code Annotated, 55-26-102 is amended by deleting the section in its entirety and substituting instead the following language:

By ordinance of its legislative body, any home rule municipality, metropolitan government, or any municipality having a population of not less than forty-eight thousand two hundred (48,200) nor more than forty-eight thousand three hundred (48,300), according to the 2010 federal census or any subsequent federal census, may authorize, regulate and control the commercial use of pedal carriages and rickshaws as modes of transportation-for-hire within entertainment, dining, scenic and/or historic areas of the center city. The ordinances shall be reasonably related to promotion and protection of the health, safety and welfare of operators, passengers, pedestrians, motorists and others visiting or working within the center city.

SECTION V. That the city manager is authorize to take all action necessary and proper to seek introduction and passage of such proposed legislation.

SECTION VI. That the board finds that the actions authorized by this resolution are for a public purpose and will promote the health, comfort, and prosperity of the public.

SECTION VII. That this resolution shall take effect from and after its adoption, the public welfare requiring it.

10-3-103. Library board -- Appointment -- Terms.

(a)

- (1) Except as provided in subdivision (a)(2), where a county legislative body or the governing body of a city or town, in lieu of giving support to a free public library already established, or of contracting with another library for library service, or of contracting with other counties or cities for the joint operation of a free public library, establishes an independent free library of its own, it shall appoint a board of seven (7), nine (9), or eleven (11) members. Not more than one (1) official each of the county and of the city governing bodies shall serve on the board. The members shall serve without salary, at least three (3) for one (1) year, two (2) for two (2) years, and two (2) for three (3) years. If the board expands to more than seven (7) members as provided in this subdivision (a)(1), the additional members shall be appointed by the county and city legislative bodies to terms of one (1), two (2), or three (3) years. All successors shall serve for terms of three (3) years. Board members may serve two (2) consecutive terms and may be reappointed after a minimum three-year break in service.
- (2) In counties or cities having a population of more than four hundred thousand (400,000), according to the 2010 federal census, or any subsequent federal census, in which the mayor has assumed the powers of the library board as provided in subsection (c), the terms of advisory board members shall be established as provided in subdivision (a)(1) with the exception that board members may serve as many consecutive terms as stated in their bylaws.
- (b) Where a county legislative body, city governing body, or a county having a charter form of government elects to participate in the joint operation of a public library maintained by the county and one (1) or more cities within the county, the library board responsible for administering the library shall be appointed by one (1) of the following methods:

- (1) Except as provided in subdivisions (b)(2) and (3), a library board of seven (7), nine (9), or eleven (11) members may be appointed by the county legislative body and city governing bodies that are parties to the agreement, the number appointed by each to be determined according to the ratio of population in each participating city and in those areas of the county that lie outside the cities, based on the most recent federal census; provided, that each governmental body shall appoint at least one (1) member. Terms of office, qualifications of members, and powers and duties of the board shall be in accordance with §§ 10-3-101 - 10-3-108. Board members may serve two (2) consecutive terms and may be reappointed after a minimum three-year break in service;
- (2) In accordance with a contract as provided in § 5-1-113; or
- (3) In accordance with a private act.
- (c) A county or city having a population of more than four hundred thousand (400,000), according to the 2010 federal census or any subsequent federal census may, by a two-thirds (2/3) majority vote of its legislative body, vest supervisory authority over the public library system with the mayor. The mayor in the county or city shall exercise all powers which would otherwise be exercised by the library board pursuant to § 10-3-104. A library board shall be retained in the county or city in accordance with this section, but shall serve in an advisory capacity to the county or city mayor, as applicable.

10-3-104. Powers and duties of library board.

The members of the library board shall organize by electing officers and adopting bylaws and regulations. The board has the authority to direct all the affairs of the library, including the authority to appoint a library administrator. The library administrator shall direct the internal affairs of the library, including hiring and directing such assistants or employees as may be necessary. The board may make and enforce rules and regulations and establish branches of service at its discretion. The board may expend funds for the special training and formal education of library personnel; provided, that such personnel shall agree to work in the library for at least two (2) years after completion of such training and education. The board may receive donations, devises, and bequests to be used by it directly for library purposes. The board may hold and convey realty and personal property and negotiate leases for and on behalf of such library. The board shall furnish to the state library agency such statistics and information as may be required, and shall make annual reports to the county legislative body or city governing body.

55-26-101. Chapter definitions.

As used in this chapter, unless the context otherwise requires:

- (1) "Pedal carriage," also known as "quadricycle," means a nonmotorized bicycle with four (4) or more wheels operated by one (1) or more persons for the purpose of, or capable of, transporting additional passengers in seats or on a platform made a part of or otherwise attached to the pedal carriage. "Pedal carriage" does not include a bicycle with trainer or beginner wheels affixed thereto, nor shall it include a wheelchair or other vehicle with the purpose of operation by or for the transportation of a disabled person, nor does it include a tricycle built for a child or an adult with a seat for only one (1) operator and no passenger;
- (2) "Rickshaw," also known as "pedicab," means a nonmotorized bicycle with three (3) wheels operated by one (1) person for the purpose of, or capable of, transporting additional passengers in seats or on a platform made a part of or otherwise attached to the rickshaw. "Rickshaw" does not include a bicycle built for two (2) where the operators are seated one behind the other, nor shall it include the operation of a bicycle with trainer or beginner wheels affixed thereto, nor does it include a wheelchair or other vehicle with the purpose of operation by or for the transportation of a disabled person.

55-26-102. Local ordinances.







Executive Summary:

Attached for your consideration is the FY 2018 Comprehensive Annual Financial Report (CAFR). The report contains management's transmittal letter to the Board of Mayor and Alderman, the Management's Discussion of Analysis (MD&A) letter that summarizes significant financial changes and overview of the City's financial condition at June 30, 2018, the auditor's opinion letter, audited financial statements, statistical tables and compliance reports.

The audit for June 30, 2018 was conducted by Brown Edwards & Company, LLP. Richard Linnen was the partner in charge of our audit and will be at the work session for any questions. Other members of the audit team were David Elkins and Ron Shadden.

Mike McIntire, the Chairman of the Audit Committee, will give a short presentation.

Mr. Mike McIntire and the Audit Committee discussed the 2018 CAFR and the results of the audit with Mr. Linnen and his audit team on December 28, 2018. The CAFR was filed with the state on December 31, 2018.

It should be noted there were no material weakness findings, no significant deficiency findings and no compliance findings listed in the report. These reports are located in the compliance section at the back of the CAFR, beginning on page 265 of the report.
