1. CALL TO ORDER: 4:30 p.m. by Mayor Clark.

2. ROLL CALL: By Deputy City Recorder Marshall.

- 3. ONEKINGSPORT FY18 PROJECTS UPDATE. Mayor Clark welcomed everyone and stated the objective of the upcoming presentations was for the BMA to receive the top recommendations for the last 22 months to achieve a higher quality of life in Kingsport. He then gave a brief history on the summit process. Ms. Jane Henry then gave an introduction to the purpose of the committee, noting there is no funding authority. She was followed by Rob Cole (Bays Mountain), Chris McCartt (Downtown Playground), Bill Sumner (Product Creation Center), Charlie Nitschke (Neighborhood Commission), and Seth Jervis (Riverfront). Ms. Henry concluded the presentation, noting the projects are in the BMA's hands now. She answered questions and discussion followed. Alderman George stated since there was no cost to the neighborhood commission and suggessted staff go ahead and move forward. Everyone agreed.
- 4. PROJECTS STATUS. Assistant City Manager for Administration Chris McCartt presented this item, highlighting the history of the property in regards to economic development in Kingsport, the recommendation being presented to the board [see Item VI.D.4 on the business meeting agenda] and the future vision for the property, including the next steps. Discussion ensued. Aldermen Olterman expressed concerns with purchasing land when there is other property that is not being used. Alderman George stated she was ok with the purchase as long as there was a firm commitment to take action and move forward. James Phillips and Lafe Cook provided further details.

[NOTE: The board took a ten minute break at this time.]

Upon reconvening the work session, City Manager Fleming stated there was a public hearing scheduled from 4:00pm to 6:00pm on August 21st for the Main Street rebuild. The hearing will be held at the RCAM building.

- 5. REVIEW OF AGENDA ITEMS ON THE AUGUST 15, 2017 REGULAR BUSINESS MEETING AGENDA. City Manager Fleming and members of staff gave a summary or presentation for each item on the proposed agenda. The following items were discussed at greater length or received specific questions or concerns.
- VI.D.2 Bid Award for the KATS Transit Center Project (AF: 221-2017). Assistant City Manager for Administration stated this project is on schedule to begin this fall with a plan to celebrate at the groundbreaking. He pointed out this would be a pivotal point in transit history in Kingsport, noting KATS is up to around 150,000 trips a year. Some discussion followed.

City Manager Fleming advised the board it was looking like Sullivan County would not approve the animal shelter, stating there could be a potential crisis situation soon.

Ms. Gail Cole, President of Engage Kingsport, asked the board what will happen after today's presentations. Discussion ensued and the Mayor stated there would need to be a called work session devoted to discussion of the ONEKingsport projects once each board member has received all the details, including funding.

Executive Summary:

The Board of Mayor and Alderman asked the City Manager to identify \$1,000,000 in capital improvements to Bays Mountain. The funding for these projects are from several sources; the Petworks New Animal Shelter, One Kingsport and General Projects account. Funds were also transferred from old projects and the projects were closed.

The ordinance will transfer \$450,000 to the Bays Mountain Improvement project, \$275,000 to the Bays Mountain Road Improvement project, and \$275,000 to the Bay Mountain Parking Lot project making total of \$1,000,000 for Bays Mountain Improvements. It also includes \$10,000 for improvements at the Farmer's Market for door access and a door at the top of the stairs, \$13,000 for Historical Survey of Downtown buildings and \$5,000 for fiber switches for Traffic Signal Cabinet. The following project will be closed: GP1224, NC1201, NC 1515, GP1748, GP1625 and GP1726.

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND VARIOUS PROJECTS FOR THE YEAR ENDING JUNE 30, 2018; AND TO FIX THE EFFECTIVE DATE OF THIS ORDINANCE

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF KINGSPORT, as follows:

SECTION I. That the General Project Fund budgets be amended by transferring \$680,000 from the Petworks New Shelter project (GP1748), \$224,700 from the One Kingsport project (GP1702) and \$95,300 from the General Projects (GP1750) to the Bays Mountain Park Improvements project (GP1828) in the amount of \$450,000, by transferring \$275,000 to the Bays Mountain Road Improvement project (GP1832) and \$275,000 to the Bays Mountain Parking Lot Improvement project (GP1833), by transferring \$25,000 from the Dilapidated Structures project (GP1625) to the Dilapidated Structures project (GP1742) and by transferring \$50,358 from the Model City Coalition project (GP1224) to the Model City Coalition project (GP1834), by transferring \$485 from the Traffic Flashing Yellow Light Upgrade project (GP1726) to the Traffic Signal Cabinet project (GP1743), and by amending the General Project-Special Revenue Fund by transferring \$1,535 from the AARP City Services project (NC1201) to the Model City Coalition project (GP1834), and by transferring \$74,205 from the Power Franchise Study project (NC1515) to the Traffic Signal Cabinet project (GP1743) in the amount of \$4,515, and \$3,500 to the HR operating budget, \$7,500 to the Development Services operating budget, \$10,000 to the Farmers Market operating budget, \$25,300 to the Legal Department's operating budget, and \$23,390 to the miscellaneous budget.

Additionally, the Agency shall be solely responsible for and pay all costs associated with the maintenance and operation of solarpowered devices, including, but not limited to, replacement of solar panels, batteries, lights and lenses.

SECTION III: The Agency agrees to comply with all applicable federal and state laws and regulations in the performance of its duties under this contract. The parties hereby agree that failure of the Agency to comply with this provision shall constitute a material breach of this agreement and subject the Agency to the repayment of all state funds expended, or expenses incurred, under this agreement.






