BAYS MOUNTAIN PARK: THE TRAIL FORWARD

Bays Mountain is the most desirable, high-profile destination the city offers, worthy of the noblest effort for generations to come. It's a crown jewel of our city, full of outdoor adventures with hiking and zip lining, a variety of animal habitats, a picturesque lake, and even a planetarium.



NEIGHBORHOOD COMMISSION: LOVE WHERE YOU LIVE

KINGSPORT WATER PLANT ONE OF THREE TO RECEIVE STATE AWARD



The Kingsport Water Treatment Plant has received the EPA Partnership for Safe Drinking Water's Directors Award for 2017. The award recognizes dedication to improved water quality through plant optimization. This is the eighth consecutive year the water plant has received this award.

CLEAN WATER AWARD FOR KINGSPORT



The National Association of Clean Water Agencies Peak Performance Award is given to clean water agencies that maintain compliance for the calendar year. Most people do not associate the wastewater treatment plant with 'clean water,' but we are all about clean water! The WWTP treats (cleans) over 3.5

billion gallons of water and returns it to the river to be used downstream for recreation, drinking, and many other uses.

KINGSPORT FIRE DEPARTMENT: ACCREDITED ONCE AGAIN



The Kingsport Fire Department (KFD) received its fourth consecutive designation as an accredited agency. When they first received this designation in 2001, they were one of forty fire departments in the nation to receive this accreditation.

KINGSPORT: FIRST & ONLY SAFE COMMUNITY ACCREDITED IN TENNESSEE



The City of Kingsport and the Sullivan County area is one of only 18 accredited Safe Communities in the United States with a shared mission of preventing injuries and saving lives.

Kingsport is the first community in the state of Tennessee to receive this honor. Safe Communities America is a rigorous accreditation program of the National Safety Council that supports and recognizes communities across the United States committed to decreasing injuries and deaths and improving overall safety at the local level. HIERARCHY OF NEEDS

KINGSPORT SETS ONE OF THE LOWEST TAX RATES IN CITY HISTORY



With reappraisals recently completed in Sullivan County, taxpayers in Kingsport are reaping the benefits of higher property values that enable the Board of Mayor and Aldermen to set the **fourth lowest tax rate in city history.** The new rate is \$1.9750 per \$100 of assessed value, while the previous rate was \$2.07.




What's that mean?

The Aa2 rating primarily reflects the city's large, expanding tax base. The rating also reflects the city's satisfactory financial position.

HEALTHY DEBT

Tennessee state law limits any city's debt ceiling to 20%. For the benefit of its citizens, Kingsport officials have capped the city's debt limit to 10%, half of what is permitted by the state. Currently, we are at 6.7% which is a testament to our leadership's commitment to fiscal responsibility and a conservative approach to borrowing and spending.



OPERATING EFFICIENCIES

Kingsport city staff has demonstrated sustained operating efficiencies from fiscal year 2010 to fiscal year 2017.

- · Kingsport's population grew 11.95% while general fund expenditures per capita increased only 10.05%.
- · Bristol's population increased by 4.43% while their general fund expenditures per capita increased 19.80%.
- Johnson City's population increased by 4.55% while their general fund expenditures per capita increased 15.67%.

Kingsport is making a concerted effort to keep expenditures within its growth limits.

YourGOV - A Tool To Report Potholes, Streetlight Outages & More

YourGOV is an innovative citizen request application that allows community members to conveniently report non-emergency issues and service requests using the web or a smartphone.

YourGOV is free and is available for use anytime. To visit YourGOV online, go to kingsporttn.gov and click on the YourGOV tab located on the homepage. If smartphone users would like to download the app, please visit the iTunes store or Google Play store.

The YourGOV app is not to be used for emergency situations. If there is an emergency, citizens should call 911.

GOING GREEN -CUSTOMER SERVICE

Did you know you can enroll to have your water/utility bill emailed to you every month?



In response to residents requesting to go paperless for their monthly water/utility bill, the City of Kingsport is pleased to offer residents this service. Not only is the paperless service more convenient for customers and environmentally friendly, it is also helping the city cut costs.

Each month, roughly 35,000 residents receive a paper bill costing the city \$17,000.

If just 25% of city residents signed up for the paperless billing, it would save the tax payers over \$52,500 a year.

If you're interested in signing up for paperless billing for your water/utility bill, you can do so in three ways:

PAVING

PAVEKINGSPORT

Paving is a foundational fundamental for our city, meaning it is a basic need for residents. Roads kept in excellent condition keep all residents and visitors traveling safely. Maintained roads also support and obtain economic growth and development.

To get objective data about the streets, Kingsport used a data driven system to assess every street in Kingsport. Using ground-penetrating radar, the city received an industry standard rating for all streets.

The data collected shows Kingsport to have 58% of roads 'at or above fair' rating. While this percentage is positive, it means 42% of roads are 'rated as poor and below.' These roads will receive paving attention first to bring them up to satisfactory standards.

Kingsport's goal is to manage a resurfacing effort that maintains streets 'at or above fair' rating over a 20 year period.

FUNDING SOURCE FOR PAVEKINGSPORT

In the past, paving was underfunded. Kingsport was on a 50-55 year paving cycle, which is almost double the recommended cycle.



The AEP Franchise Fee comes from a renewed 20-year contract with Appalachian Power (AEP). Through this agreement, the board finally was able to identify the funding source that will maintain city streets at a very high level.

The City of Kingsport had a 99-year contract with AEP and since 2011, the city and AEP have worked together to formulate a plan moving forward, as the original contract ended in 2016.

Companies, such as AEP, providing residents and businesses a service in a specific geographic area that have been granted the right to serve, are able to provide a funding source back to the community through the city.

Annual funding for paving breaks down into two segments. The first 90% of the funding is for asphalt maintenance. This includes repair of lowest scoring roads in neighborhoods, heavily traveled roads and isolated lowest scoring roads. The remaining 10% funds beautification efforts for Kingsport. This includes concrete maintenance, such as concrete streets and sidewalk repair, and mowing and landscaping crews.
